

Pakistan's Historical Balancing Act



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- Foreign policy oscillates between alignment and autonomy
- Always a **balancer** rather than a loyalist
- Leveraging location between Gulf, Central Asia, and Indian Ocean
- From Cold War alliance with US to CPEC with China
- Mastering the art of "renting" geopolitical position for survival and leverage



The Pasni Proposal: A Geopolitical Hedge



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- Informal US investment offer for Pasni port (75km from China's Gwadar)
- Signal to Beijing: Islamabad has **other doors** to knock on
- Signal to Washington: Pakistan can still offer access, if not allegiance
- → Pasni: "clean slate" vs. Gwadar's Chinese entanglement
- Psychological counterweight to China's monopoly on Pakistan's coastline



Economic Context: A Nation in Crisis



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- Pakistan is **broke again** struggling to meet IMF conditions
- Rupee in freefall, debt repayments consuming fiscal capacity
- **CPEC** momentum lost Chinese disbursements slowed
- Gwadar remains underdeveloped and unpopular locally
- Beijing's patience with Pakistan's security and fiscal chaos wearing thin
- Offering Pasni: reviving foreign capital flows under the cloak of strategy



Security Challenges: The Balochistan Factor



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- A Pasni lies in **Balochistan** province simmering with insurgency and resentment
- Baloch nationalists view Gwadar and CPEC as symbols of exploitation
- "American foothold" in Balochistan would be radioactive domestically
- Instant resistance from insurgents anti-state sentiment too entrenched
- No U.S. corporation would invest billions under such conditions
- Military might promise security, but regional politics too volatile



Geopolitical Calculus: Great Power Responses



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United States

- Intriguing but not urgent Navy already has access through Oman, Bahrain, Diego Garcia
- Geopolitical symbolism of re-entry into Pakistan carries strategic weight



China

- A Viewed as **betrayal in slow motion** erodes psychological assurance
- \$ Likely to respond economically: tightening credit, delaying CPEC phases
- Pakistan may provoke its largest creditor at a moment when it can least afford to
- A double-edged signal that could restore balance or destroy trust



Conclusion: A Whisper of Rebalancing



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"This is not a realignment. It's a whisper. Pakistan is not choosing the United States over China; it's merely reminding China that choices still exist."

- **Diplomacy as performance** a stage whisper designed to echo in Beijing's ears
- Offering what Islamabad no longer fully owns credible strategic space

- Part genius, part desperation: reintroducing Pakistan into global conversation
- ▲ If overplayed, Pakistan risks alienating both benefactors the worst outcome
